Factors & Forces: Tree Risk Assessment for Tree Workers

Trees or tree parts frequently fail when a factor that leads to strength loss encounters an external force that exceeds the tree's capacity to resist breakage. The Factors and Forces tree risk protocol provides tree workers with insight on identifying potential weaknesses in a tree and guidance on how to develop safe work plans that direct forces away from structural defects.

Utility Storm Work – Unloading Wires Under Tension a Teaspoon at a Time
